

Passion Sunday (Palm Sunday) March 28, 3021

Isaiah 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Mark 14:1-15:47

[The First and Second Readings are the same every year but the Passion account is taken from a different gospel – A, Matthew; B, Mark; C, Luke. The Passion from John is read on Good Friday.]

There is great hostility in the story we have just heard, all of it directed against Jesus.

There is the hostility of the chief priests, of the Roman soldiers, of those who passed by and jeered as he hung from the cross. Alongside the hostility of those who rejected Jesus, there is the failure of those who had been closest to him. His disciples all deserted him and fled; Judas betrayed him and Peter denied him publicly. Yet, there were a few people who responded to Jesus in that dark hour faithfully and nobly. There was the anonymous woman who in an extravagant gesture of love and respect anointed the head of Jesus. Then there was the Roman centurion, who looked on as Jesus died and exclaimed, 'this man was son of God'. Joseph of Arimathea took the bold step of going to Pilate to ensure Jesus had a dignified burial. The women disciples who looked on from a distance noted where Jesus was buried and went away to prepare spices to anoint his body at the earliest opportunity. All of these people, men and women saw Jesus with eyes of faith and love.

The story we have just heard invites us to identify with those who saw Jesus with the eyes of faith and love, who recognized the light of God in the darkness of Jesus' passion and death. When we look upon the passion and death of Jesus with such eyes, we see a divine love that is stronger than sin, a divine light that shines in all our darkness's, a divine power that brings new life out of all our deaths, a divine poverty that enriches us at the deepest level of our being. We have heard the story of Jesus' last journey told in the space of ten minutes. This Holy Week, the church invites us to travel that journey at a much slower pace, day by day as it were. We are invited to enter into that journey with the eyes of the anointing woman, the centurion, Joseph of Arimathea and the group of faithful women. We look beneath the surface of what is happening, we listen deeply to all that is taking place, so as to recognize the good Shepherd who laid down his life for us all, so that we might have life and have it to the full.

MESSAGE FROM THE OREGON STATE CHAPLAIN REV. JAMES HERRERA

Dear Sisters in Christ,

As I sit to write this message to you all, we find ourselves well into the season of Lent. While we are not quite to the halfway point, we are getting close. I pray that these Lenten Days this year have been fruitful and that your spiritual exercises that you have undertaken during these holy days are helping you to see the areas in your life in which you have failed to follow the commands that God has given to us, the areas in which we need to continue to grow in the virtues of Christ, what things that you need to bring to Jesus for forgiveness in the sacrament of Reconciliation, and the penance that you must do for reparation of those sins.

Lent comes to us at roughly the same time each year, the springtime. We can look outside and see the first signs of life starting to spring up from the earth. Each day I go outside, and I can see where another plant has burst through the earth, reaching for the warmth of the light and the sun. I can look at the many bushes that I have planted around the yard each with leaves starting to get bigger and bigger. The part that amazes me is how each of the plants that has been lying dormant through the cold and dark winter days and are now exploding forth from the earth.

This is a good image for us to have in our minds during these Lenten days. Not only are the plants waiting to burst forth with new life, the joy and love that comes to us from Jesus alone is waiting to burst forth in our own lives. As the joy and love of Jesus bursts forth from our hearts, it goes out to permeate every human being that it comes in contact with.

Lent is a time for us to do some Spring cleaning in our spiritual gardens, to remove all the debris from the year before, to remove all the branches that did not bear fruit, to fertilize and nurture. In other words, this is a time to get ourselves in order. To repent of our sins and do penance so that Jesus can permeate through us in everything that we say and do. So that Jesus' joy and love can not only be felt in our lives and hearts, but so that every person we meet each day will also encounter the love of Christ.

If you have not had the opportunity to begin your Lenten work, there is still time to start. Let us use this time wisely to return to God with all our hearts, so that when we come to the great celebration of Easter, we can celebrate and rejoice, and let our Alleluia's ring out through the entire land.
